
United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea Vanuatu signed the Convention on the Law of the Sea in 1982

The Late former Prime Minister Father Walter Lini in 1984 established the **National Committee** on Maritime Boundary **Delimitation (first body** to govern our ocean).

- 1984 & 1987 negotiations on resolving outstanding maritime boundary delimitation.
- From 1987 2004 (17 years) nothing happened in the oceans space.
- The announcement of the deadline for countries to make submissions for a claim on an Extended Continental Shelf Submission by 13th August 2009 to the UNDOALOS, prompt Vanuatu Government to take serious action in making a submission.
- In 2007, Vanuatu government re-established the National Committee on Maritime Boundary Delimitation, to resolve all outstanding matters on Maritime Boundary Delimitation with neighbor countries, dispute over Matthew and Hunter Islands and possible submission for an Extended Continental Shelf.
- In 2009 the government further reviewed the composition and the mandates of the committee and injected fundings to facilitate the work of the committee. On 2012, the national committee further extended its mandate from maritime boundary to its Ocean space and beyond. The national committee felt that the issue of resolving outstanding maritime boundary should encompass the issue of ocean governance. Given that there was no policy or legislation to manage our oceans given that our entire EEZ is still unresolved.
